Tales From the Almas Crupt

As told by Frank Ireton, Past Potentate

This month's **Tales From the Almas Crupt** and *Alibi* cover comes from the 1957 January-February issue of *Almas Life*. The *Alibi* was published under the moniker of *Almas Life* for several years. I have not been able to track down the reason for the change, the date of the change, or duration of the change due to gaps in *Alibi* issues available. There are 3–4 years of issues published under this name in the **Crypt**. Maybe more sifting through the stacks will shed light on the question. Letters to the editor seem to indicate the change took place at the first of that year and reflect kindly towards the name and format change.



Illustrious Sir Herbert A. Friede, 1957 Almas Potentate, was the son of a pioneer family and was born in October 1899 in West Virginia. He attended public schools and received technical training in electrical engineering from Wheeling University. He served in the U.S. Calvary during WW I and in the Corps of Engineers during WW II. Later he worked as an electrical engineer in the DC Electrical Department. He was raised in June 1922 but the lodge is not listed. He joined Osiris Temple later that year and became an Almas Shriner in 1944. He was a member of several Masonic lodges—serving

as Master of his home lodge. Additionally, he was a member of both Royal Arch and Scottish Rite. He married his childhood sweetheart, Margaret Lewis, in 1927. They had two daughters and one grandchild at the time of the bibliography.

Shrine circus, and this ad cropped to fit here, for Almas handling the registration of your car. An interesting note the ad states that cars registering in the name of a wife, widow, or unmarried daughter will not be denied. Column ads included all kinds of services—upholsters, insect control, sewing machine service, and, perhaps the strangest ads I saw, a full-time motel broker and travel specialist in case you were interested in getting into the motel business. Several of the three columns pages were two columns of ads and one column of Almas activities.

Tales From the Almas Crupt (Continued)

In other news from this issue, the last ceremonial of 1956 saw the creation of 96 new Almas Nobles and two courtesy conferrals for Naja Temple from Deadwood, South Dakota. This Ceremonial was dedicated to honor Grand Sovereign Commander Luther A. Smith who was presented with an honorary



Almas life membership. A business meeting was opened at 3:30 p.m. at the Temple. This was to be followed by the Candidates, along with several units, to march from the Temple to the Statler Hotel where the Ceremonial was to be held. Unfortunately, heavy rains necessitated shuttle bus service. Following the First Section, almost 10 column inches of distinguished guests were introduced. This was followed by a well-received Second Section. The Temple closed at 10:45 p.m.

Almas hosted a Christmas Party sponsored by the P&T Club in the Temple ballroom for underprivileged children. The names of more than 200 girls and boys ranging in ages from six to fourteen were suggested by the Salvation Army, Gospel Mission, The Southwest Settlement House, Arts and Science Club, and Almas Nobles. Transportation was provided by Red Cross Station cars and escorted by the DCMPD. Other transportation was donated by local cab companies and private automobiles. The Almas Clowns greeted the children at the Temple with balloons, noise makers, and a souvenir cap. This was followed by lunch, storytelling, a special Christmas film, and entertainment by the Almas Temple German Nut Band. The party ended with a visit from Santa, who with the assistance of his Elves, handed out gifts of choice to the children.

A short article reported on a Temple activity titled Operation Enthusiasm. The activity's purpose was to promote membership in Almas and how best to sell Almas membership. Tips such as where to visit—Blue Lodges and appendant bodies—and a list of talking points about Shrine activities and fellowship. Another article mentions Almas hosting a luncheon for guests from the Masonic and Eastern Star home. Residents were transported to the Temple on busses donated by a Noble owned transportation company. Upon arrival ladies received a corsage and the men received a boutonniere. Distinguished guests included the Grand Master and the Grand Worthy Matron and Patron. Entertainment was provided by the German Nut Band and the Almas Military Band.

FAMOUS FEZ

HARRY HOUDINI



When it is said that Freemasons are men that come from all walks of life, the notion is entirely true. For centuries, men across the globe have come together to share in the joys of brotherhood and learn from the Masonic teachings. These men are doctors, laborers, politicians, scientists, musicians, and even magicians, perhaps the most famous of which is Harry Houdini.

Celebrated for his groundbreaking and awe-inspiring stunts and illusions, Houdini was also an ardent Freemason with a charitable nature. His open-handedness was perhaps due to his growing up in dire poverty and struggling to survive on the lowest rung of society. Houdini knew the joys of entertaining and supporting other people and lived his life accordingly. He lived an extraordinary life that came to a tragic end, and his story is certainly worth the telling.

Prince of the Air

Harry Houdini was born Erik Weisz in Budapest, Hungary, on March 24, 1874, to a large Jewish family. He was one of seven children and his parents, Rabbi Mayer Sámuel Weisz and Cecília Steiner brought the family to the United States when Erik was four. They arrived in America on July 3, 1878, on the *SS Fresia*, changing their name to the German spelling Weiss and Erik's name to Ehrich.

Ehrich's father became a rabbi of the Zion Reform Jewish Congregation in Appleton, Wisconsin, where the family lived until 1882. Rabbi Weiss became an American citizen that year but lost his job serving the congregation at Zion. The family moved to Milwaukee and soon to New York City, where they moved into a boarding house. Like many immigrant families of the era, they were poor, and the children had to find work. At just nine years old, young Ehrich performed the first of what was to become a lifetime of stunts when he performed as a trapeze artist. The young daredevil named himself Ehrich, the Prince of the Air.

Ehrich was drawn to magic from a young age and was coached by the magician Joseph Rinn at the Pastime Athletic Club. With his penchant for performing, Ehrich expanded his repertoire to include escape acts and magic acts, although they earned him little notoriety. In 1893, Erich married fellow performer Wilhelmina Beatrice Rahner, who regularly assisted him on stage during his performances under the name Beatrice "Bess" Houdini.

Yes, Houdini was a Mason

The Mill Valley Masonic Lodge No. 356 has an interesting article on their website about "Masons and Magicians." So many of the great magicians from the Golden Age of Magic were Freemasons, including Houdini.

According to the article, "Bro. Houdini" was initiated as an Entered Apprentice on July 17, 1923 in St. Cecile Lodge No 568 in New York City. He passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on July 31, 1923, and was raised to the Degree of Master Mason on August 21, 1923. In



1924 he entered the Consistory, which is the fourth and final degree in the Scottish Rite.

Houdini's masonic activities included giving a benefit performance for the Valley of New York which filled the 4,000 seat Scottish Rite Cathedral and raised thousands of dollars. In October 1926, just weeks prior to his death, he became a Shriner in Mecca Temple. His last rites, held November 4, 1926 at the Elks Clubhouse in New York, concluded with traditional Masonic Rites.

Other famous Freemason magicians of the day included Thurston, Carter, Chung Ling Soo, Blackstone, Kellar, and Houdini's brother Hardeen.

ALMAS YACHT CLUB HISTORY

The Almas Yacht Club was formed to provide an organization for those Shriners interested in sailing on the waters surrounding the Chesapeake Bay.

The conception of the Almas Yacht Club was the result of a group of Almas Shriners interested in forming such a club in 1955. The yacht club, consisting of 23 members, became an entity in 1956 when it received its charter. The first Bridge consisted of the following: Commodore – Alton S. Bradford, Vice Commodore – Edward C. Baltz, Rear Commodore – Robert Doing, Fleet Captain – Garrett Beitzell, Secretary – Jack J. Blank, Treasurer – Roy Lyman Sexton.

Membership in the Yacht Club has fluctuated over the years. From its meager beginning of 23 members, it grew to 86 by 1967 and had a fleet of 54 boats ranging in size from 12 feet to 67 feet in length. Records are a bit sketchy from the early years, but by 1982, membership had decreased to 70 members with 27 boats. In 1991 there were 57 members and 22 boats; 1999 had 37 members and 13 boats; in 2012 there were 43 members and 7 boats.

The decreasing boat numbers dictated that we had to change the focus of the club from one of boating activities to include land functions as well where we would meet at a variety of restaurants or similar locations to conduct meetings and take care of the business of the club. We still maintained our membership in the Mid-Atlantic Association of Shrine Yacht Clubs (MAASYC) where we would meet at a selected location for the annual summer rendezvous. Many members of the other yacht clubs in MAASYC would bring their boats and engage in a friendly competition of a boat parade, boat decoration and other fun activities. We also participated in the activities of the annual Mid-Atlantic Shrine Association (MASA) where the several Shrine Temples engaged in a variety of club competitions which would culminate in the annual parade.

The ultimate goal of the numerous activities of the temple yacht clubs was to win the Evers Trophy, a large trophy awarded to the yacht club which amassed the most points over a twelve-month period beginning with the MASA convention parade were the Shrine Centers compete with their floats and marching units. The name "Almas" appears on this trophy several times.

From the outset, it should be noted that our Ladies have always been an intricate part of the Yacht Club. Over the years they have provided delicious meals and refreshments at many of our functions and assisted in many of our activities. We will always be grateful for their willingness to be an active part of the club.

Although it has been necessary to change some of our boating activities, we have never compromised our enthusiasm, zeal or any of our Shrine principles to enjoy good fellowship, welcome new Nobles and their Ladies into our club, provide support to the members when needed, and support the Shriners Hospitals for Children.

The Yacht Club extends an invitation to all Shriners to investigate and join in our activities and consider becoming a member.

FEZ FOODIES

CHOCOLATINI

INGREDIENTS

- 2 ounces* Irish cream (like Baileys)
- 1 ounce creme de cacao
- 1 ounce vodka
- Cocoa powder and brown sugar, for the rim (optional)
- Chocolate syrup (optional)
- Grated chocolate, for the garnish (optional)



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Prepare the glass: Wet the rim of a martini glass. Spread 1 tablespoon each cocoa powder and brown sugar on a plate, stir them together and spread into a single layer. Dip the outside of the rim of the glass into the plate. If desired, pour a swirl of chocolate syrup into the martini glass.
- 2. Add the Irish cream, creme de cacao and vodka to a <u>cocktail shaker</u>. Fill it with 2 handfuls of ice and shake it until cold.
- 3. Strain the drink into the prepared glass. If desired, garnish with grated chocolate.

FEZ FIZZIES

EASY OREO TRUFFLES

INGREDIENTS

- 2 (8 ounce) packages semisweet baking chocolate
- 16 ounces cream-filled chocolate sandwich cookies (such as Oreo), divided
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Melt chocolate in a saucepan over low heat, stirring occasionally, 4 to 6 minutes.
- 2. While the chocolate is melting, place 9 cream-filled sandwich cookies in a food processor and blend until finely crushed. Transfer crumbs to a bowl and reserve for decorating.
- 3. Add remaining cookies to the food processor and blend until finely crushed. Transfer crumbs to a large bowl and stir in cream cheese; mix until well-blended. Roll mixture into 42 balls, about 1-inch in diameter.
- 4. Place each ball in melted chocolate and use two forks to roll it until fully coated. Lift the ball with both forks and allow excess chocolate to drip off.
- 5. Place coated truffle on a wax paper-lined baking sheet and sprinkle with reserved cookie crumbs to decorate. Repeat to make remaining truffles.
- 6. Refrigerate truffles until firm, at least 1 hour. Keep in the refrigerator until just before serving. Enjoy!



The Greeters are to greet Nobles and their guests to various Temple activities and are to be comprised of the new nobles created in the past year.

As a new noble, we want you to be an active part of Almas. The best way to do that is to learn more about the Shrine upon initiation. And the best way to do that is to join a club or a unit. The Greeters will become the first club you will join. It will be automatic upon initiation.

For the next year, you are asked to perform the duties of a Greeter under the direction of the Director of the Greeters. During that year, you will meet other nobles and learn more about the Shrine. At some point you may join another club or unit based on your interests. At that time, you may either rotate out of the Greeters or remain as a member, continuing to serve this important function.

The uniform of a Greeter is white dinner jacket, tuxedo shirt and pants, black shoes and socks and a Shrine bow tie. We will only use the uniform during special events as dictated by the potentate. At non-formal events, the Divan uniform for the year will serve as the uniform of the Greeters.

The Greeters meet at the call of the Director, generally once a month after the monthly business meeting.

Ceremonial Cast

The Ceremonial Cast is responsible for presenting the initiation for new nobles. There is more than one degree in the initiation which includes not only the ceremony in which you participated, but also an Arch Degree which encompasses a presentation of all the Masonic Bodies collectively. The Arch Degree requires more than 50 nobles to present and is intended to be more for the families of new nobles than for the nobles themselves. To my knowledge, Almas Shrine has never presented the Arch Degree, but it is something to which we aspire.

The primary ceremonial is the ritualistic initation and can be presented either open or closed at the discretion of the Potentate.

Being a part of the Ceremonial Cast includes some memorization, but it is also intended to be the 'fun' ritual where we can dress in costumes and have a good time while presenting good ritual. It would be nice to be a ritualist but that is not required as there are non-speaking parts as well as behind the scenes activities that go into the Ceremonial.

Generally, we have three rehearsals to prepare for each Ceremonial, but can also participate in parades in costume as well. The Ceremonials are held two times a year.

Almas Yacht Club

The Almas Yacht Club was formed to provide an organization for those Shriners interested in sailing on the waters surrounding the Chesapeake Bay.

The conception of the Almas Yacht Club was the result of a group of Almas Shriners interested in forming such a club in 1955. The yacht club, consisting of 23 members, became an entity in 1956 when it received its charter. The first Bridge consisted of the following: Commodore – Alton S. Bradford, Vice Commodore – Edward C. Baltz, Rear Commodore – Robert Doing, Fleet Captain – Garrett Beitzell, Secretary – Jack J. Blank, Treasurer – Roy Lyman Sexton.

Membership in the Yacht Club has fluctuated over the years. From its meager beginning of 23 members, it grew to 86 by 1967 and had a fleet of 54 boats ranging in size from 12 feet to 67 feet in length. Records are a bit sketchy from the early years, but by 1982, membership had decreased to 70 members with 27 boats. In 1991 there were 57 members and 22 boats; 1999 had 37 members and 13 boats; in 2012 there were 43 members and 7 boats.

The decreasing boat numbers dictated that we had to change the focus of the club from one of boating activities to include land functions as well where we would meet at a variety of restaurants or similar locations to conduct meetings and take care of the business of the club. We still maintained our membership in the Mid-Atlantic Association of Shrine Yacht Clubs (MAASYC) where we would meet at a selected location for the annual summer rendezvous. Many members of the other yacht clubs in MAASYC would bring their boats and engage in a friendly competition of a boat parade, boat decoration and other fun activities. We also participated in the activities of the annual Mid-Atlantic Shrine Association (MASA) where the several Shrine Temples engaged in a variety of club competitions which would culminate in the annual parade.

The ultimate goal of the numerous activities of the temple yacht clubs was to win the *Evers Trophy*, a large trophy awarded to the yacht club which amassed the most points over a twelve-month period beginning with the MASA convention parade were the Shrine Centers compete with their floats and marching units. The name "Almas" appears on this trophy several times.

From the outset, it should be noted that our Ladies have always been an intricate part of the Yacht Club. Over the years they have provided delicious meals and refreshments at many of our functions and assisted in many of our activities. We will always be grateful for their willingness to be an active part of the club.

Although it has been necessary to change some of our boating activities, we have never compromised our enthusiasm, zeal or any of our Shrine principles to enjoy good fellowship, welcome new Nobles and their Ladies into our club, provide support to the members when needed, and support the Shriners Hospitals for Children.

The Yacht Club extends an invitation to all Shriners to investigate and join in our activities and consider becoming a member. Ownership of a boat is not necessary.

Care of a Lodge - pl

Attendance: The First, Last, and Most Important Care of a Lodge

As Masons, we all know of our dwindling numbers. With the exception of a few bodies, the general trend of our membership has been downwards for the past many years. It is in this light that I posit what appears to be a commonsensical approach to the problem: a drive to increase attendance in our lodges and appendant bodies.

Attendance is the ultimate solution. If a member attends a lodge, perhaps after years of absence, he rekindles the spirit that animates our Fraternity. Being with friends is itself a benefit that no money can buy. Our brothers may have observed that the number of Masons who have been raised to the sublime degree are much more than those in attendance at our stated meetings. Where have all these good men gone?

One would argue that attendance by itself is a simplistic solution to a complex problem. It seems so simple. But consider the following: if you happen to be a lawyer, and you represent a client, and you are not present during the scheduled hearings, what is the consequence? You may be given a default judgment, which may be adverse to your client. More than that, your reputation will be negatively affected. Another example: if you are a student and you are absent in your examinations, you will not advance in your studies, no matter how brilliant you are. If you are an excellent driver, but you ignore the DMV's schedule for you to take a driver's license, you cannot lawfully operate a motor vehicle on the streets. Attendance is a must in important matters. As Masonry is important to all of us, our presence in our lodges plays a vital part in the prominence of the Fraternity in our lives.

Brethren, I have one, and only one, suggestion. From the list of inactive Brothers, our Secretary or Master may wish to distribute to us, respectively, every single name, with contact details, of each brother that the lodge desires to invite to reconnect with the Fraternity. A long-lost brother assigned per active member to call and successfully invite to attend lodge would be a big boost in the revitalization of our assemblies. If there are say, thirty active members, and all of them, correspondingly, contact thirty others (one active member to invite just one inactive member), easily that would become a one hundred percent increase in participation. The power of one brother will result in a dramatic increase in the roll of active members.

WALL OF HONOR


